

- Develop clear guidelines that link funding decisions to performance
- Release data on performance against targets for individual grants



Move from donor-specific data collection and reporting systems to strengthened national systems



Give greater weight to programmatic
in addition to financial targets in
performance assessments

The Bottom Line



PEPFAR: establish clear guidelines tying funding decisions to performance and release data



Global Fund: increase data quality used in performance assessments by strengthening national systems



World Bank: shift emphasis to programmatic performance in addition to financial targets

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
